
This month we pray for refugees and migrants and highlight the many people who give hope to those who accompany them, providing safe and secure places where they can live with dignity.

## **The Office for Refugees**

Through compassionate action, the Diocesan Office for Refugees coordinates sponsorship efforts, supporting parishes, religious communities and individuals in responding to the global refugee crisis. Working with the Government of Canada under the Private Sponsorship of Refugees (PSR) Program, the Office provides practical hope to those forced to flee war, persecution, and instability.

Rooted in the Church's mission to welcome the stranger, the Office guides parish communities (constituent groups) to sponsor refugees under the Diocese's Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH) status. The office staff supports co-sponsors, often family members of refugees already living in Canada, who assist them financially and emotionally. They accompany sponsors and newcomers through the entire process from application to arrival and integration, bringing together faith, compassion and community to extend a lifeline of hope.



## **The Role of SAH**

As a Sponsorship Agreement Holder, the Diocese of Hamilton serves as a trusted partner with the Government of Canada to facilitate refugee sponsorship.

This includes:

- ensuring all sponsorship applications meet Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada's (IRCC);
- training and approving constituent groups and co-sponsors;
- overseeing applications after submission and ensuring that newcomers receive appropriate support after arrival.

This model enables faith-based, communitydriven responses where local parishes become instruments of welcome and transformation. The relationship established between the Diocesan Office, parishioners and co-sponsors form a circle of care, offering not only a fresh start, but a warm welcome to refugees grounded in faith and compassion.



"In Waterloo Region, there are many people who are so grateful to the Office of Refugees and St Michael Parish for transforming their lives. From the moment the local family's appeal for assistance is accepted the positive impact ripples through their lives. First there is hope – the refugees now see a way forward to lives free from war, persecution, and uncertainty. When the newcomers arrive, there is great joy at being reunited with their family members. They marvel at the opportunities for education, health care, and employment. Gradually they release the anxiety and stress of their previous life, their mental health improves, and they focus on their future for themselves and their children." – Diane Jones, St. Michael Parish, Waterloo



## A Ministry of Hope and Healing

In a world marked by displacement and despair, the Office for Refugees shines as a beacon of hope. It reminds us that every refugee is a person made in the image of God, longing for dignity and a place to call home.

**During the past fourteen years, the Diocese has positively impacted the lives of over 725 individuals and families** from Vietnam, Afghanistan, Syrian Iraq, Eritrea, Sudan, Myanmar (Burma), Democratic Republic of the Congo (DCR), and Somalia. The completion of the settlement process can often take between three and five years.
